# Background

Theater of War Productions (TOWP)

#### "To Comfort the Afflicted and Afflict the Comfortable"

- Social impact theater company (co-founded by Phyllis Kaufman and Bryan Doerries, 2009)
- Community-specific projects as free, public events
- Stavros Niarchos Foundation (SNF) grantee

Dramatic readings of ancient Greek tragedy texts and contemporary texts to address pressing public health and social issues

### Public health-related projects

### Category: Caregiving & Death Theater of War Frontline Project

Presented to audiences of doctors, nurses, Emergency Medical Teams (EMTs) and other members of the frontline community in response to the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic.

#### The Nurse Antigone

*Antigone,* performed on Zoom in 2022, with a chorus of frontline nurses, voiced the nurses' experiences during the pandemic.

### **Category: Pandemic & Climate Crisis**

TOWP performed *Oedipus the King* in the Digital Amphitheater as part of the first ever Nobel Prize Summit called *Our Planet, Our Future* (2021).

## **Public Artists in Residence (PAIR)**

Artists as creative problem-solvers for the city's challenges:

Bryan Doerries was named Public Artist in Residence for the City of New York in 2017 (two-year tenure).
